Community Plus+ appreciates the ongoing support and partnership with Jacobs in the design process. They give generously through skilled volunteering while we work together with the Qld Government's Economic Development Queensland and the Department of Communities, Housing and Digital Economy on the design and delivery of the new community building. Our partnership with co-locators for the new Villa Street site, Annerley Stephens History Group and All Gauge Model Railway continues to thrive and we are excited by the possibilities for our community.

Our strategic focus for the year continued to prioritise governance and engagement. Community Plus+ continues to prioritise our financial sustainability through policy and best practise. The Champions model was initiated to create a connected structure between our Management Committee and Operations team. The model has each Committee member aligned to an operational priority. Combining the Champions model with financial sustainability, we ensure connected and responsible governing decisions for the future of Community Plus+.

MANAGER'S REPORT

This year more than ever I start by extending heartfelt gratitude to staff, volunteers, committee, partners, supporters and friends who have all worked so well together the past year to ensure we continue to actively listen & respond to and evolve with the communities we're connected to. 2020-2021 is the second year running we, as a place-based organisation run by community for community have responded to the ongoing health, social and economic impacts of the COVID-19.



In all that we have delivered and achieved, we continue to demonstrate how Community Plus is uniquely placed to respond to the impacts of COVID-19 across our communities. Building on strong grassroots relationships enables us to understand changing community needs and our agile modus operandi, anchored in a community development framework, allows us to adapt and respond quickly to meet new challenges and take up new opportunities.

We recognise the immeasurable value of secure funding from the State Government to enable us to confidently plan and deliver a diverse range of neighborhood centre and development programs, projects and events across a regional model, spanning the inner southside of Brisbane from West End through to Annerley, Fairfield and Yeronga. We also thank our partners, Tenants Queensland for their management and support to deliver the Queensland Statewide Tenants and Advice Service (QSTARS) program and for coordination of the Make Renting Fair Campaign in support of progressive reform of QLD renting laws.

After a COVID-19 induced hiatus, we once again took up the work with our corporate partners JACOBS, and our co-locators Annerley Stephens History Group and All Gauge Model Railway, to ensure our expertise in delivering a unique localised model is represented in the design and delivery of the new Yeronga Community Centre building. We look forward to the unveiling of a community asset we can all be proud of.

With 3 lockdowns during the year, we unfortunately had to close the usually wide-open doors of our centres during these periods and I am so proud of the way our team responded to ensure we could continue our core business - connecting with, caring about, and looking after our existing neighbourhoods, reaching out to grow our network, to engage with and support the most vulnerable in our immediate and broader community. We prioritised our online communications; COVID Safe planning & training for staff, volunteers and students and rolled out a series of COVID safe interactive neighbourhood projects to build and maintain local community connections.

Community Plus+ was fortunate to receive the COVID-19 government stimulus payments which reduced the significant financial loss that had been predicted for the financial year. These stimulus payments have been essential given our loss of fundraising revenue in 2020-2021, giving us time to focus on our core business, while refurbishing plans to develop sustainable models of income generation.



FOOD WITH THOUGHT



At Community Plus+ we believe everyone should have access to fresh nourishing meals.

Through our **Food With Thought Program**, we provide food relief to people experiencing food insecurity across our communities with support from The Siganto Foundation, Oz Harvest, Food Bank and Bakers Delight Yeronga.

Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic last year, we have distributed more than 18 000 high nutrition meals to community members impacted by financial hardship. In addition to distributing regular meals, our community pantries are open to the community 24/7 and restocked daily with care items, dry goods and non-perishables.

The way the program is delivered also encourages social connections, capacity building and sustainability education with staff, students, volunteers and community members. The program was initiated by a core group of staff and volunteers at the start of lock-downs, activating the community kitchen at **Yeronga Community Centre** to nourish the community.

Many of this same group, were part of the activation of the community kitchen in the Yeronga Flood Recovery Centre a decade ago.

Community Plus+ has been working with all stakeholders this year to ensure the design of the new **Yeronga Community Centre**, being built at the old Yeronga Tafe site, delivers vital community infrastructure including a commercial kitchen, as we know from recent and past history this community asset will be activated by and for local people in any future disaster response and recovery.



"So much of what Community Plus+ does flies under the radar... their ability to adapt during the COVID-19 shutdown and support the needs of the vulnerable has demonstrated to us how important it is to have them in our communities," Anna Siganto (Chair Siganto Foundation).

PEOPLE'S PARK & KIOSK ACTIVATION



July 2020 **West End Community House** proudly partnered with 98.9 FM to positively activate this significant cultural space following a number of stakeholder meetings held in the community the year before raising concerns about, disuse, lack of upkeep, and safety issues. The words of Dan Rennie (98.9 FM Station Manager) & Kylie Waldren (WECH Community Development lead) tells the story best:

"Being here in West End, it really made sense to have a presence here and to see a logo up there, and even when you walk into this space, you feel that energy. It's a vibe, and I think you feel that particularly when you know the history of Boundary Street, Musgrave Park and the significant areas for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people," Dan Rennie

"Yes, there is quite a strong history. I think by bringing some life into it, bringing in some services. Bringing in 98.9, bringing in health care providers, it just brings life to the space. It's exactly what it needs, and we don't want to lose this space." Kylie said they have set up meetings with stakeholders and traders and received a positive response.

"It's something that they've wanted. They wanted to see 98.9 come back into the space and bring that cultural component back. There's a lot of history to be shared, and there's a nice partnership that can be formed from this, and it also brings business back into West End."

Celebrating with an official launch in September 2020 - 98.9 began broadcasting once again from the KIOSK. Since then we have welcomed, residents, visitors, local traders, musicians, artists, community groups, WECA and Kurilpa Futures and our corporate partners JACOBS into activating the space, with weekly programs and pop-ups for Mental Health Week, significant First Nations Cultural events, Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC celebrations.



ACTIVATING SPACE THROUGH CULTURAL LEADERSHIP

West End Community House, in partnership with Brisbane Indigenous Media Association, received BCC community funding to engage local artist Duane Doyle to paint up different elements around this space and to supervise and mentor other members of the community to collaborate on this community art project.

COMMUNITY CONNECTION & BELONGING PROJECT

PATHWAYS OUT OF HOMELESSNESS

The **Community Connection and Belonging project** is a new community development place based initiative developed and delivered in partnership with Annerley Baptist Church and Brisbane City Council. The project evolved over many years of working together via the Annerley Homelessness Network, listening to people's experiences of insecure housing.

In the listening, we recognise that a home is more than the four walls of a house and community connection and belonging are vital to sustaining housing as well as reducing loneliness and social isolation. The project delivers a community based response to homelessness, engaging local residents as community connectors to walk alongside people as an ally to assist with practical advice and housing support.

Sixteen community connectors have been recruited and trained to build Inclusion and Belonging practice in place. Community Connectors contribute in various ways from preparing the weekly community lunch and lounge, helping people move, attend housing inspections and appointments, tutoring in English and much more with an annual contribution to the value of \$183,000.

People linked in with community connectors report they have developed family like relationships and found allyship through the project to help them overcome the challenges of insecure housing, work and finances.

The project has provided the opportunity for community connectors to also experience deeper community connections and belonging.

A Community Lunch is held every Monday with an average of 45 people attending. All are welcome to be involved in the preparing and sharing of the lunch, to create valued roles and relationships. Our *Community Lounge* is held every Wednesday where people can seek support with keeping and finding a home as well as other practical needs.

"This was our turning point. It gave us a new life. We feel so blessed to link up in this community and receive this assistance. We feel strong connection and sense of gratitude here."


